

From the time he was a fledgling baseball player, nearly 10 years ago, Brad Binder always had an appreciation for first base-

He grew up idolizing players such as Von Hayes and John Kruk of the Phillies, and tried to emulate other notable first-sackers such as Will Clark, Rafael Palmiero and Frank Thomas.

"I just tried to learn from watching all those guys and take a little bit from each one," said Binder, now a 17-year-old in his second year as a starter for West Lawn's Legion team.

Binder was also guided in the right direction by his father, Rick a former standout basketball player at Reading High who coached Steel-High to the PIAA-AAA championship in March.

"I take a lot of pride in what he's accomplished," Brad said. "He's always been a big influence; he was a big part of me being interested in sports in the first place."

But while Rick made his name on the basketball court, Brad, a slick-fielding, sweet-swinging first baseman, has carved out an identity on the baseball field.

Through Tuesday, the lefthanded hitting Binder was hitting .385 with one homer, four doubles, four triples and 25 RBIs for the Owls.

"There's no doubt when he goes up to the plate, you see that something in his eye," West Lawn coach Tony Matz III said. "He's just so focused. He looks like he's ready to hit at all times, and he's such a good, line-drive hitter."

Binder cracked the Owls lineup last season, when he was named a "Skills Day" selection to Berks County's Carpenter Cup team. He quickly earned a reputation as one of the league's most promising players.

A high school campaign this spring in which he hit a team-high .435 with eight doubles didn't do anything to dispute that notion.

"I like to be in the spotlight," Binder said. "When the stakes are high, I like to be in that situation. and hopefully more often than not I'm going to succeed and help the team win."

With the dangerous Josh Yocum batting directly ahead of him, Binder presents a big problem for opposing pitchers out of the cleanup hole, comprising a one-two punch Matz considers his top lefty power-hitting duo ever.

"I think it's advantageous to both of us," Binder said. "They can't pitch around Josh as much, and then when I come up he's usually on base anyway."

Brad is a quiet competitor, which is in stark contrast to the fiery demeanor his father displayed as a player and now as a coach.

"I think I take after my mom (Colleen) in that respect," Brad said. "I definitely take after the Flannery side of the family. I'm not going to be yelling and screaming or that kind of thing; I'm a lot more laid back than him."

But while Brad may have a different personality and is following a different sport than his father, there can be no denying they share a very familiar penchant for success.





If the Owls can take care of three more of them, their lofty goal will become reality.


■ Pitchin' attrition: The league's already depleted supply of quality pitching took another big hit last week when several top pitchers went down for various reasons.




Vroman retired 12 in a row at one point and allowed just two hits until Exeter scored its final four runs on five straight two-out hits in the bottom of the ninth.



Swing the thing for Shane

For West Lawn's Shane Stacherski, it don't mean a thing if you ain't got the swing... and he's got it.

Even though he isn't the biggest guy in the world.

Off the field or in the dugout, Shane Stacherski isn't the type of player who strikes fear in the hearts of the opposition.

Maybe it's because of his soft-spoken demeanor, or his 5-10, 150-pound frame.

Whatever the case, the 17-year-old is certainly not the most intimidating presence on West Lawn's Legion team.

Until he steps into the batter's box.

That's when Stacherski goes from passive to aggressive. From laid-back to lock-and-load. From Clark Kent to Superman.

"Shane likes to swing the bat, no doubt about it," West Lawn coach Tony Matz III said.

And the results have been damaging to opposing pitchers around the Berks Legion League this summer.

"What impressed me the most about him was how far he can hit the ball for not being a real big kid," said Shillington coach Bob Houck, who saw Stacherski go 6-for-7 with two homers, two doubles and eight RBIs in two victories over the Red Sox. "I was shocked, not just by how quick his bat was or how many hits he had – but also by how far he hit the ball."

Even Stacherski has come away shaking his head at his powerful production this summer –

.419 average with a team-high 62 hits, four homers, 58 RBIs and a .696 slugging percentage.

"I really don't know how to explain it," he said. "Prior to this year, I don't think I'd ever hit a home run out of a park. People say I have good bat speed. I just try to get up there and hit line drives and hit the ball hard, and get on."

Stacherski, who bats cleanup, credited much of his success to batting behind the Owls' marquee lefty-hitting duo of Josh Yocum and Brad Binder – a tandem that has provided him plenty of RBI opportunities.

"Without them, I wouldn't have this kind of season," Stacherski said. "Then you consider we have a great leadoff man in (Eric) Pettit and guys behind me like Tony (Cipolla) and Davey (Schultz), and it helps a lot, because I get a lot of pitches grooved to me."

Stacherski - whose uncle, the late John Spadafora, was a member of West Lawn's lone state championship team in 1962 - has been in an offensive groove much of the year. During the scholastic season at Wilson he hit .339 with six doubles, four triples and a team-high 24 RBIs.

"When most people think of us in terms of

hitters, they think of Yocum and Binder," Matz said. "But we've never put Shane very far behind them. We feel Shane is just as important to us as the other two."

Stacherski has been important in plenty of ways to the Berks League regular season champion Owls (31-12), who open the Pennsylvania Region 2 Tournament today against Lehigh Valley League playoff champ North Parkland at 1:05 p.m. at Allentown's Bicentennial Park.

Despite not pitching for five years, the righty has performed admirably since being pressed into mound duty early in the season – going 4-3 with a 3.34 ERA in 56% innings.

Defensively, Stacherski also has proved to be a valuable asset – shuttling from left field to right field and even third base, where he has filled in lately for injured starter Regan Carroll.

"Whatever I get called upon to do," he said, "
I'll do, whether it's taking a pitch for the team,
moving around in the field or going out and
pitching."

Still, Stacherski is most dangerous when he steps to the plate and sets the tone for the Owls lineup.

"I wouldn't classify him as a hacker, because he knows the strike zone pretty well," Matz said. "And I don't want to classify him as strictly a streak hitter, because his slumps don't last very long. But when he goes on a hot streak, he can be very hot.

"When he's on, you can see it in that first atbat. His hands get through the zone so quick."

And the opposition comes to the quick realization that, as far as Stacherski is concerned, looks can be very deceiving.

"He said his arm bothered him," Cougars coach Joel Graff said. "This was his first time pitching in a big situation."


"I told the guys we could score more than two runs in the game," West Lawn coach Tony Matz said. "The guys took it to heart and scored five right away."



"It was just a very good offensive showing. Our goal is to get back to the championship game and that's what we're working on."



"I knew I had it, it was just a

"I knew I had it, it was just a matter of the umpire making the call," said Binder. "It was so high, it was a difficult call I guess. The way I saw it the ball was well fair, but it's not my call to make. It was called foul, and after that there's not much you can do about it."

In Binder's case no. But in Konnick's case 'yes. The Bears' leader, who went 3-for-4 with three RBIs, quickly regrouped. He didn't let the blast faze him, and he stepped back on the rubber with a clear

head.

"Yeah, when it went off the bat I knew it would be gone," said Konnick. "But once it was called foul, it was just a long strike to me. That's how my attitude is. When I get out there, I just say to myself that no one can beat me. I just think that good things will happen. It was foul, it didn't matter. Then I just went back to work."





Vroman, Owls shock Red Sox

Brett Vroman blanks
Shillington on five hits
and moves West Lawn into
Berks League Tournament
final against Boyertown.

Even after it was all over, Brett Vroman still didn't quite realize the magnitude of what he had just done.

On a steamy Monday night more suited to loung-

ing around the pool than pitching a playoff

game, Vroman achieved a feat that the last 62 other starting pitchers from American Legion teams in the county, state and beyond had failed to accomplish.

Not only did the 18-year-old righty go the route in a 6-0 victory over Shillington in a Berks League Tournament elimination game at Bear Stadium, he became the first pitcher to shut out the Red Sox this season.

Vroman's victory had plenty of ramifications: It earned the Owls (31-11) a spot in tonight's 7:05 Berks championship against Boyertown (33-14); handed the Bears the league's other Region 2 berth; and ended the season of the Red Sox (38-7), who will fail to defend their Region 2 and state titles.

"As good a pitching performance as I have ever seen," West Lawn coach Tony Matz III said.

Shillington coach Bob Houck, whose team failed to advance to the Berks final for the first time in his six-year tenure, echoed those sentiments.

"To do what he did against this lineup says a lot for him," Houck said after the Red Sox could manage just five hits against Vroman. "To shut these guys down, you have to have something on the ball."

Over the past month, Vroman has had plenty on the ball in assuming the role of the team's ace. Since earning the victory with four shutout innings of relief in a 10-8 regular season victory over Shillington June 25, he has been

virtually unbeatable.

"That was probably the game that got me going," said Vroman, the team's lone final-year player.

Vroman continued his roll with three strong performances over Exeter, including a complete game in Thursday's 7-3 first-round victory. But Monday's effort, in which he struck out six, was by far his most impressive.

"Brett's been pitching with a lot of confidence lately," said West Lawn pitching coach Steve Carroll. "He knows he can get guys out, and he knows he can get out of any situation."

Mixing a mid-80s fastball with a slider and changeup, Vroman (8-1) beat the Red Sox for the first time since Birdsboro's Buddy Hernandez went the route in last year's 3-0 county championship victory.

And he gave a pretty good indication it was going to be his night early, escaping trouble in the first inning after Shillington's Justin Holland laced a one-out triple down the right-field line.

"At that point I was thinking to just try to get out of it only down a run," admitted Vroman, who had the unenviable task of facing the dangerous duo of Vinnie Rinaldi and Dan Batz in succession.

He did a lot better than that – striking out Rinaldi (13-for-19 in the tourney to that point) and getting Batz to weakly pop back to the mound.

"That definitely started it all off," said Vroman, who started learning the game as a batboy for Birdsboro and Exeter, where his father Skip coached.

The Owls hitters - led by cleanup hitter Shane Stacherski - succeeded where the Red Sox could not against Vroman. They scored three in the first to give Vroman all the support he would

need. Stacherski (3-for-4, four RBIs) hit a two-run double off the centerfield fence, then scored on a single by Dave Schultz (2-for-3).

Stacherski launched a solo homer to left-center to make it 4-0 in the third, and, after Brad Binder doubled in another run in the sixth, hit an RBI single in the eighth for the final margin.

"We know we're already in in regionals (by winning the regular season) and states (by hosting the event)," Vroman said. "But we still want to prove to everybody we belong there, and we want to earn our way there."

Thanks in no small part to Vroman, the Owls have done exactly that.

"Brett can be a pretty funny guy in the dugout," Stacherski said. "But once he gets out to the mound, he's all business."

And Monday night, it was Vroman who gave Shillington the business as the Owls soared into tonight's Berks championship game.



Still, the Owls blew several opportunities to give themselves some breathing room.





Caln, comprised mainly of players from Coatesville High's PIAA Class AAA runner-up squad, scored an unearned run in the first inning when leadoff man Marc Laquintano legged out an infield single, moved to second and third on passed balls by Dave Schultz and scored on D'Amato's single to right.

The Owls took an early lead in the first when Eric Pettit drew a one-out walk, stole second, moved to third on a passed ball and scored on a wild pitch.


