The summers ago, Tony Matz III
aw something special.

Even though the West Lawn coach was enduring his only losing eason in 12 years, he knew the fure was as bright as the sun shinning over Muhlenberg's field that varm day in July 1997.

The inexperienced Owls, who tarted as many as nine first-year layers, had just been eliminated rom the Berks Legion League layoffs by Shillington.

Instead of reflecting on West Jawn's 19-22 record, blown hances, youthful mistakes and what might have been, Matz chose o look ahead.

"We had a good feeling about those kids," he said. "We had eard so much about them, and their work ethic, we felt very good bout their future."

The future arrived in a flash last hen the Owls (36-15 overall) wen. Jo-2 to win the league's West-2rn Division, advanced to the eague championship round and eague championship round and and yon their first Pennsylvania Region 2 title.

With all but one player returning from that team, it's no wonder West Lawn's sights are set as high as the Cellular One tower outside the left-field fence at Owls Field.
"I would say this is probably the most explosive team we've ever had," Matz said.
Combined with the rarity that the Owls are hosting the Berks and Region 2 Tournaments, it is quite apparent that West Lawn has a chance to enjoy the most special season in the history of the 45-year-old franchise.
"This is it," said first baseman Brad Binder, one of seven 18-year-and that the of seven 18-year-and the of se

"This is #," said first baseman Brad Binder, one of seven 18-year-old starters. "We have plenty of talent We have a ton of leaders. We have experience. We've all played in big games. It's just a matter of executing and putting it all together."

With Binder, center fielder Josh Yocum, shortstop Tony Cipolla and right fielder Shane Stacherski leading the way, Matz can put together the most potent offense in the league. Last August, virtually the same lineup shattered the Region 2 record for runs scored in a tournament.

On the field, third baseman Regan Carroll and second baseman Regan Carroll and second baseman Andy Hohl join Binder and Cipolla in an air-tight infield; Yocum, Stacherski and Eric Pettit patrol a strong outfield; and Dave Schultz is a solid receiver behind the plate.

On the mound, right-hander of Matt Fidler anchors a pitching staff that has plenty of depth – in righties Stacherski, Yocum, Cipolla, Jon Rudisill, Brad Impink and Mike Schaeffer – but also a few question marks.

Matz is certain the next six weeks will provide plenty of answers for the Owls, who are heavy favorites to repeat in the West, where Muhlenberg (13-9, 17-14) appears to be their only challenger.

But he also is quick to point out that other preseason favorites and sure bets have come up empty-handed in the postseason. A prime example is Shillington, which last eyear won its first 10 games and started 32-4 and then couldn't move through the Berks playoffs.

"These grys have to understand that no matter how good we are, in this league there's always some-body else out there who wants to take it away from us," Matz said.

"We have to keep that in our minds on a daily basis. We can't feel as if we can just show up and the game will take care of itself.

"Hopefully our guys will realize the reality of what happened, for n whatever reason, to Shillington elast year. Maybe the Owls had a flast year maybe the owls had a flast program have been envisioning for a couple of years.

Winning pitcher Tony Cipolla had four hits, including a home run, and drove in four runs as West Lawn trounced Muhlenberg 20-4 Wednesday night in a Berks Legion League Western Division game at Laureldale.

The game was a dramatic departure from Monday, when the teams played until rain forced a postponement. That one was tied 1-1 afer three innings.

The Owls (7-0, 9-1) scored five runs in the first inning and led 7-1 after three. They ended any Muhlenberg hopes when they scored seven times in the seventh inning to take a 16-4 lead.

West Lawn, which finished with 14 hits, also took advantage of eight errors by the A's (4-2, 6-2).

Schaeffer, Owls continue to roll

Mike Schaeffer's fifth start is his most impressive yet for powerful West Lawn, a complete-game five-hitter in an 11-2 win over Birdsboro.

When West Lawn Legion coach Tony Matz gave Mike Schaeffer the ball against Ephrata two weeks ago, his message to the Owls rookie was crystal clear.

In the first game of what is arguably the most anticipated season of the Owls' 45-year history, it was Schaeffer who took the mound.

Trial by fire? More like faith in the future.

"I wanted him to realize he was going to be one of our starters this year," Matz said. "It was a situation where I wanted him to feel comfortable, even though he was a firstyear player."

Thus far, Schaeffer has looked lenty comfortable. And Saturday afternoon at Optimist Field, the right-hander continued his impressive start by firing a five-hitter in West Lawn's 11-2 Berks Legion League interdivision victory against Birdsboro.

Schaeffer (2-0) struck out 10 and also went 2-for-4 with three RBIs as the Owls (8-0 Western Division, 10-1 overall) continued their methodical march through league play. Through eight games, West Lawn has outscored Berks foes 136-26.

"This lineup will always get you runs," Schaeffer said. "It's so deen"

So is the pitching staff, now that Schaeffer is firmly entrenched in the rotation. Saturday's start was Schaeffer's fifth, and by far his most impressive.

"Schaeffer's got real good stuff," said first baseman Brad Binder, who went 5-for-5 with three runs to front a 17-hit attack. "He's got a good, live arm and when he spots the ball he's really tough. Today he was really on."

The Owls staked Schaeffer to a lead with a four-spot in the sec-

ond inning - in which he helped himself with a two-run single.

Schaeffer allowed just one hit until the fifth, when Pete Colon doubled in a run to get Birdsboro on the board. The Orioles (2-3 East, 6-5) got within 4-2 when Brad Kepley (2-for-4) scored on a wild pitch in the sixth inning, but the Owls broke it open with a three-run seventh capped when Schaeffer drew a bases-loaded walk.

"When they got it to 4-2, we knew we had to respond," Binder said. "It was really the first time we'd been tested this year, and that was a good thing for us."

Tony Cipolla was 2-for-4 with a double and three runs and Dave Schultz drove in four runs for the Owls, who racked up 14 hits against Birdsboro ace Jeremy Wunderlich over 723 innings.

"They keep coming at you,"
Birdsboro coach Chris Drowne
said. "They play nine innings, and
today we only played three."

Which wasn't nearly enough against Schaeffer, whose fastball, curve and change repertoire had the Orioles guessing practically all afternoon.

"I was pretty excited, but I wasn't real nervous," Schaeffer said.
"The seniors have really made me
comfortable so far, and that's given
me a lot of confidence."

That confidence was on display thoughout the game, and enabled Matz to allow Schaeffer to go the distance.

"I actually came into today more concerned about what our hitters were going to do against Wunderlich than about how Mike was going to do," Matz admitted. "We were realistically hoping to get six or seven (innings) out of him, but we broke it open in the seventh inning and saw that his pitch count was pretty low, so we decided to let him finish."

Schaeffer finished strongly, pitching out of jams in both the seventh and eighth innings before working a perfect ninth.

"He battled us and he didn't hurt himself," Drowne said. "He came right after our hitters and made people hit the ball. And we didn't."



It took Brad Impink about nine months to realize how much he appreciated baseball.

And during his spring break from the University of Pittsburgh in Februrary, the 18-year-old Impink re-evaluated how he wanted to spend this summer.


"I decided right then that I wanted to play again," Impink said. "Even if we would have just had an average team, I would have still wanted to play again."

"I guess it's a combination of the kids and the three organizations which run them," echoed West Lawn coach Tony Matz III. "Those three programs are about as committed as they come in Berks

ertown, which through the years has demonstrated that the best way to prepare for the rigors of postseason tournament play is to build a deep pitching staff, emphasize fundamentally sound play and seek an active regular season schedule against as many opponents as possible.

No one can argue with the success the Bears have enjoyed over that span. 



A's rally in ninth to stun West Lawn

■ Muhlenberg, which hands the top-seeded Owls their first loss in 19 games, continues to exceed expectations in the Perks Legion playoffs.

When the Berks Legion playoffs started four days ago, Dick Gochnauer never expected his team to challenge for the Berks Legion championship.

After all, that role had been relegated to West Lawn, Boyertown and Shillington, winners of seven county championships in the 90s.

But he did *hope* that his young Muhlenberg team would be there.

The A's took another step in that direction Sunday by beating top-seeded West Lawn 11-10 with five runs in the ninth inning. Muhlenberg (21-10) will play Boyertown at 7:05 tonight at Owls Field. The winner will get the league's Region 2 berth and will meet West Lawn (33-4) Tuesday for the county championship.

West Lawn beat Boyertown 10-6 Saturday in the winner's bracket final to earn a spot in the title game. The loss to Muhlenberg was West Lawn's first in 19 games.

Not as skilled as the Boyertowns and West Lawns of the league, Gochnauer said Muhlenberg used a lot of heart and a little luck to get where they are.

"When West Lawn scored four runs in the sixth, they knew they were still in it," Gochnauer said of his team. "They didn't quit. They just never gave up."

Not quitting is something they've done all tournament long. As the No. 6 seed, Muhlenberg had already pulled off the playoffs' biggest upset in the first round with a win over third-seeded Shillington. Saturday, they came from behind to beat Exeter 15-12 in an elimination game.

West Lawn coach Tony Matz III said he never expected the heavily favored Owls to run away with the game.

"They played with a lot of adrenaline and a lot of emotion," Matz said. "I knew they would. They were down to their last stick. We didn't come out with a let down, we just played poorly."

Matz said Gochnauer's teams have always been a tough team to beat in crunch time.

"Muhlenberg has always been a resilient team," Matz said. "That's just the way they are. They don't die."

Muhlenberg scored the first two runs and led until the seventh inning, when West Lawn tagged right-hander Matt Nye for four runs to take a 7-6 lead. The Owls scored three more runs in the eighth inning and took a 10-6 lead into the ninth inning.

Kraig Kemp, who, as an 18-year-old, thought he might be playing his last inning of Legion ball, led off

the Muhlenberg ninth with a single.

Pinch-hitter Nate Bentley walked and Nate Guers hit a two-run triple to chase right-hander Josh Yocum, who had relieved Shane Stacherski in the seventh inning.

Right-hander Jon Rudisill didn't fare much better. He retired the first two batters he faced, conceding an RBI groundout that made it 10-9, but gave up a single to pinch-hitter Andy Zenyuch and a double to Jason Reinhart, both with two outs.

Brian Kantner then bounced a single through the left side of the infield and past a diving Tony Cipolla to drive in the tying and go-ahead runs.

Brad Kantner, who earned the save in Muhlenberg's upset of Shillington, pitched a scoreless ninth inning for the win. Rudisill (2-2) took the loss for West Lawn.

"This is unbelievable," Kemp said. "Coming back from being down four runs against the best team in the league – I just can't believe it. It's awesome."



■ West Lawn wins its first Berks
Legion League title since 1991 behind
16-year-old ace Mike Schaeffer, who
throws a complete-game five-hitter

against overachieving Muhlenberg.

Mike Schaeffer knew he would get the ball this summer.

The first-year pitcher for West Lawn's Legion team figured he would get to throw every fifth day, along the way getting in a little on-the-job training from the rest of the Owls' veteran pitching staff.

What Schaeffer didn't realize, however, is that come the postseason, he would be the team's stopper.

Specifically, the guy West Lawn coach Tony Matz III wanted on the mound for Tuesday's Berks League championship against Muhlenberg.

"I knew I'd be part of the team and all," Schaeffer said. "But to be pitching in the championship? ...

That's something I never considered."

After West Lawn won its fifth county title with an 11-1 victory at Owls Field, there is no question who is considered the staff ace.

The right-handed Schaeffer (7-0) went the route on a five-hitter and struck out six as West Lawn (34-4) captured its first Berks crown since 1991 before a crowd of 1,357.

Schaeffer, one of just five 16-year-olds on a roster laden with two- and three-year starters, may not have known how valuable he would be in the Owls'

But Matz said he had a pretty good idea who his ace would be even as the season was ending in the state tournament a year ago.

"I felt he could have pitched for us last year," Matz said of Schaeffer, who opted to play Junior Legion at Spring Township. "We all knew what he could do, so I wouldn't call this a real surprise to

any of our coaches.

"The biggest thing about Mike is that we know when we send him out there, we can send him out there for nine innings."

Schaeffer, who started the season opener in May, said he turned the corner in a complete-game victory over East contender Birdsboro in mid-June. But the biggest boost of confidence came in Saturday's 10-6 winners bracket final win over archrival Boyertown, when Schaeffer slammed the door on the Bears with three shutout innings of six-

"The last two games are the best I've thrown all year," Schaeffer said.

The Owls definitely needed the strong-arm performance against the feisty A's (22-11), who were within 3-1 heading to the seventh thanks to a clutch performance by 3-year-old lefty Nate Guers (4-4).

But West Lawn was able to break it open after two errors and a walk paved the way for six unearned runs. Tony Cipolla had a sacrifice fly, Shane Stacherski had a two-run double, Dave Schultz doubled in a run and Andy Hohl singled in two more to finally finish the Cinderella A's – who had knocked off league powers Shillington, Boyertown and West Lawn in a magical five-day span.

The win also was sweet for the Owls' final-year players, who had suffered a humiliating 18-1 loss to Boyertown in the final last year.

"Speaking for the seniors," said Stacherski, who went 3-for-5 with two RBIs to lead an 11-hit attack, "we knew it was our last chance to get it done. We got there last year and got our butts kicked,

and we didn't want it to happen again."


It didn't, thanks to a 3-for-5, two-run effort from Eric Pettit, two RBIs each from Schultz and Hohl, and a near-flawless defensive effort that backed Schaeffer.

"This was pretty special," said Matz, whose team had gone 0-4 on its home turf in the last two tournaments the Owls hosted – the Berks tourney in 1995 and the state tourney in 1998. "To come out here and do it in front of all these fans for a five-day period is a great feeling."

West Lawn will open defense of its Pennsylvania Region 2 title on Tuesday with a first-round game against Lehigh Valley League regular season champion North Parkland at Owls Field at 7:30.

The A's, meanwhile, open the Region 2 tourney against Lehigh Valley League No. 2 seed Lower Macungie at Owls Field at 12:45 p.m.

"Schaeffer did a super job for them," Muhlenberg coach Dick Gochnauer said. "I felt pretty good about our chances until that seventh inning, but then it all sort of fell apart."



For A's, dream ends but respect lingers

The clock finally struck midnight for Muhlenberg, the Berks Legion League playoff's Cinderella story, but not before the pesky A's gave West Lawn all it could handle for most of Tuesday's championship game at Owls Field.

Sixth-seeded Muhlenberg pulled off the three biggest upsets of the tournament - a 4-3 win over No. 3 Shillington in the first round, a game 13 win over No. 1 West Lawn and an unlikely win over Boyertown Monday that propelled the A's into the championship game. They also came from seven runs back Saturday to beat Exeter 15-12.

They just couldn't beat the high-powered Owls (34-4) again Tuesday night.

This Cinderella didn't have a fairy godmother watching over it, but Dick Gochnauer, Muhlenherg's coach, said it had someone .lse guiding it.

"When you get momentum on your side, it seems like everything just clicks," Gochnauer said. "We

had it until we fell apart in the seventh inning, but I feel good about our team. We had an excellent run and we'll be back next week in Regionals."

West Lawn coach Tony Matz called Muhlenberg (22-11) "downright scary" and admitted he was worried about facing the A's in the championship game.

After a look at Muhlenberg's playoff resume, who wouldn't be?

"What they accomplished by upsetting Shillington, Boyertown and West Lawn - you had to be a little scared of them," Matz said. "You've never seen anything like this - a team coming into the tournament and upsetting three teams considered by many to be a cut above the rest."

The A's hung around until the fateful seventh inning, when starter Nate Guers and reliever Nate Bentley combined to give up six unearned runs. Guers had held West Lawn to three runs until that point and Muhlenberg trailed just 3-1. West Lawn padded the score with two late runs.

"It was a good game for a long time," said West Lawn first baseman Brad Binder. "I don't think the score was indicative of how good a game this was."

Muhlenberg catcher Joe Faller said beating the Berks Legion's "big three" and getting to the tournament's championship game was some consolation.

"No one ever expected us to do this," Faller said. "We proved to everyone that we are for real. It feels really good."

Binder said the A's are talented, but have something else that's allowed them to get as far as they

"They play well together, but more importantly they play with a lot of emotion and a lot of heart and they never seem to give up." Binder said.

They're not done yet.

Muhlenberg clinched one of the Berks Legion League's two berths in the Region 2 tournament by virtue of its win over Boyertown Monday and will play Lower Macungie Tuesday in the first round.

And they're not just happy to make it - they'd like to make the same waves in that tournament


Carroll can also be somewhat of a clown and cut-up in the dugout, but his tenacity and mental toughness are no laughing matter.


Which is why Yocum's sluggish start in the first two days of this year's Region 2 Tournament was mystifying to himself, his teammates and West Lawn coach Tony

And when Yocum hit into a double play in his first time up in Thursday's elimination game against Lower Macungie, the lefty slugger had just two singles to show for his previous nine at-batsan uncharacteristic performance from a player North Parkland coach Terry Stoudt referred to two nights earlier as "the best hitter in the state"

"The last couple of days I knew I wasn't getting the job done," Yocum admitted. "I was disappointed in some of my at-bats, and I think I was pushing myself a little."

Fortunately for the Owls, Yocum found his stroke before it was too late in helping West Lawn extend its season with an 18-8 victory at Owls Field.

Yocum went 4-for-6 with six RBIs, two doubles and a three-run homer for West Lawn (37-5), which will face Northampton League top seed The Birches in an elimination game today at 7:30 p.m.
"I did so well last year, I guess I thought I could just go out and do it again," Yocum said. "But the last couple games I wasn't swinging

Yocum began to make things happen in the fourth inning, lacing a leadoff double and eventually scoring on a wild pitch to get the Owls within 3-2. He also singled in the sixth and delivered a run-scoring groundout in the seventh to cap a four-run rally.

But Yocum was far from finished, saving his two best at-bats for the final two innings.

In the eighth, after West Lawn had rallied to take its first lead at 9-8 on Eric Pettit's RBI single, Yocum hit a bases-loaded groundrule double over the right-field fence. Tony Cipolla followed with a three-run homer to left to high-light an eight from the right-field.

ight an eight-run inning that made t 15-8.

Then in the ninth, in his final plate appearance, Yocum launch-

ed a towering three-run homer to right - his team-leading seventh - for the final margin.

"Josh hadn't been swinging up to his standards, and when he came up with the bases loaded (in the eighth), we certainly couldn't afford another bad at-bat," Matz said. "I was thinking we might have to have him take some pitches, but when I asked him how he felt, he felt good. I just figured he's 18, and I'd let him decide."

Matz had some tough decisions of his own to make regarding the Owls pitching, pulling starter Matt Fidler in the top of the fifth of a 3-3 game after Steve Parr hit a leadoff double. Parr wound up scoring later in the inning, then Lehigh Valley League runner-up Lower Macungie (24-11) got four uncarned runs in its sixth - the big blow a two-run double by Brian Martin - to make it 8-3.

When West Lawn and Muhlenberg last met 11 days ago, the Berks Legion League championship was at stake.

Today, the two county rivals will square off again, this time with a berth in the Pennsylvania Region 2 Tournament championship game on the line.

Berks champion West Lawn continued its rally through the losers bracket of the double-elimination tournament Friday night, defeating tourney unbeaten The Birches 18-4 at Owls Field.

The defending Region 2 champ Owls (38-5) and A's (25-12) meet today at 12:30 p.m. at Owls Field, with the winner facing Northampton League top seed The Birches (23-7) approximately 30 minutes afterward.

It will be the fifth meeting between the two Western Division rivals, with West Lawn having won three of the first four games, including an 11-1 victory in the Berks championship.

"We just have to take it one game at a time," said first baseman Brad Binder. "And then take it from there."

With Thursday's dramatic 13-12 winners bracket final victory assuring The Birches of its first Region 2 title-game appearance, coach John Konawalik wasn't about to use any valuable pitching.

Konawalik started 16-year-old righty Bobby Snyder, who didn't have a decision all season. Needless to say, West Lawn's potent lineup took care of matters.

Binder went 5-for-5 with two runs to lead a 19-hit barrage against five different pitchers as the Owls won their third straight game after opening the doubleelimination tourney with a 7-4 loss to North Parkland Tuesday.

West Lawn coach Tony Matz III, on the other hand, wasn't about to take any chances, sending ace Mike Schaeffer to the mound. Schaeffer (10-1), who earned the victory in Thursday's come-frombehind 18-8 win over Lower Macungie, went the route on a seven-hitter and struck out six.

"There's no way you can think about tomorrow (today) before taking care of this game," Matz said. "We saw what those guys had done the first three days, and knew that this was the way to go."

During West Lawn's two previous appearances in the Pennsylvania State Legion Tournament, the Owls didn't even have to travel outside Berks County.

In 1991, West Lawn qualified for states when Boyertown hosted the event, and last year, the Owls themselves played host to the eight-team tournament.

"Being in such a very familiar surrounding, you just didn't get that feeling of being in a state tournament," said Tony Matz III. "You didn't get that feeling of traveling and being away from home."

That won't be the problem this week, when the Region 2 champion Owls make the 412 trip to St. Mary's - an Elk County town of 5,500 in Pennsylvania's northwest portion - for the state tournament.

Berks champion West Lawn (40-5) has a tough opening-round draw. meeting Region 7 champ State College (46-6) Tuesday at 5:05 p.m. State College returns much of the team that last year finished second in the state before winning the Northeast Regional and advancing to the semifinal round of the American Legion World Series in Las Vegas.

In other openers Tuesday, Region 3 champion Paoli (33-5) meets Region 8 champ Hopewell (28-6) at 10:05 a.m., Region 6 champ Moon

"I think we were a little vulnerable to really good pitching last year, but I think this year we've all worked on different things and are better prepared for the tournament. Plus, we only had one 18year-old, and didn't have that kind of experience."

Matz is hoping the Owls' rely on their experience from last week. when they rallied from a firstround loss to North Parkland to win five straight games - including two Saturday - and earn their second straight Region 2 crown.

"I think they know now that the strength of this team can really show the longer we stay alive in these tournaments," Matz said.

West Lawn's main strength is a potent lineup led by Binder (.521, 68 RBIs), Josh Yocum (.421, 8 HR, 68 RBIs), Tony Cipolla (.438, 79 runs) and Eric Pettit (.438, 70 runs). Last week, the Owls scored a Region 2-record 89 runs in six games, breaking their previous mark of 80 set last summer.


"We fought real hard to get here," Binder said, "and now we want to make the most of it."

Paoli and Moon Township are each making their first state tournament appearances. Paoli stunned perennial power Yardley Western by winning two games (12-5, 17-10) for the Region 3 title Saturday, while Moon Township scored eight runs in the top of the ninth for a 14-10 victory over Mount Lebanon in the Region 6 final.

Montoursville, which beat Greater Pittston 19-10 for the Region 5 title Saturday, is making its third state appearance, including a second-place finish in 1987, when Mike Mussina was the staff ace.

Hanover is led by blue-chip lefty prospect Mark Phillips, who struck out 17 in Saturday's 11-1 Region 4 championship win over Quarryville. Hopewell, which defeated Linesville 9-2 for the Region 8 crown, is making its seventh state appearance since 1982, with its best finish third at Muhlenberg in 1994. St. Mary's (24-4), which went 2-2 in the Region 8 tourney and was eliminated by Hopewell, last qualified for states in 1991.



Line is a good term to use when speaking of Binder's hitting, which more often than not produces ropes to all parts of the field.

"I really don't try to hit homers," said Binder, who nonetheless has five of them. "I don't try to drive it out of the park. I try to hit it on a line."

Binder credits a lot of his hitting philosophy and intense focus at the plate to his idol growing up, former Phillies great Mike Schmidt

"I have his book, The Mike Schmidt Study," Binder said. "It's as in-depth a hitting book as I've ever

seen. He was my favorite player, but the frustrating thing is that I wanted to play third base like him, but I never could because I was left-handed."

Instead, Binder made the logical move to first, where he has been a mainstay for the Owls over the last three seasons.

"His fielding alone is just outstanding," Matz said. "I'm not just talking about picking the occasional ball in the dirt. Just the way he fields around the base is special. His fielding is arguably as good as I've ever seen at first base around

But what impresses most people about Binder is his overall presence in the batters box. Try to challenge him and he will turn on a fastball with ease. Try to pitch

him away and he will shoot the ball down the third-base line. And ty to strike him out ... It's been done just four times in 182 plate appearances this year.

"I'm really just trying to take what they give me," said Binder, who credited the rest of the lineup for giving him plenty of opportunities. "You know you're going to see to lot of good pitches when Yocum bats behind you, and with Regan (Carroll) and Eric (Pettit) on base all the time, there are a lot of chances to drive runs in."

There was once a chance that Binder would follow in the footsteps of his father, Rick, a standout baskethall player and highly successful coach at Reading High who is the head coach at Steel-High.

But Brad's enthusiasm for basket-

ball began to diminish, and by the time he reached high school he had already decided baseball was his sport.

"I played (basketball) up until ninth grade, but for whatever reason I just didn't really take to the sport," he said. "The way I looked at it, if I wanted to play a sport, I wanted to play it well."

Dahlen struck out four and allowed nine hits over seven-plus innings before turning it over to ace Mark Phillips, who locked down a 4-1 victory at Berwind

"It was really frustrating all day," Owls first baseman Brad Binder said. "But we just have to put it behind us and keep fighting."

Region 4 champion Hanover (25-3) advances to tonight's 7:35 p.m. winners bracket final against Paoli, which beat Montoursville 12-4. Berks and Region 2 champ West Lawn (41-6) faces Region 8 champ Hopewell (29-7) in an elimination game today at 12:05 p.m.

"Our lineup had to give some support today, but we didn't get any," said Owls coach Tony Matz III, whose team was held to its lowest offensive output of the season. "We had to score more than one run against these guys."

West Lawn's Brad Impink gave Matz a complete-game effort, striking out six and scattering 11 hits. But the only support came in the bottom of the second, when Andy Hohl's two-out single to left scored Tony Cipolla to make it 1-0.

Hanover drew even in the third on a two-out RBI double by Jeremy Becker (3-

for-5), then went up to stay with a three-run third keyed by Phillips' long solo homer to right and Dahlen's two-run single.

That would prove to be enough for Dahlen (5-2), who had gone 82/2 innings of an 8-5 non-league win over West Lawn in May. Changing speeds effectively and moving the ball all over the strike zone, he continued to confound a lineup that had averaged more than 15 runs over its past six games.

"Donny's got such a unique motion, and he's got a lot of movement on his ball." Hanover coach Troy Wentz said. "He won't get a lot of strikeouts, but not too many teams hit the ball well against him."

West Lawn finally seemed to solve Dahlen in the fifth, when Impink, Regan Carroll and Eric Pettit singled consecutively to load the bases with one out. Dahlen then fell behind Binder 3-0 before eventually getting him to hit into a 4-6-3 double play.

"That one took the biggest wind out of our sails," Matz said. "We didn't have many opportunities early, but we seemed close to getting him as the game went on."


